## TEXTILE WASTE

- End-of-life clothing and textiles, such as clothes, towels and bedlinen
- They may be holey, worn, stained, or otherwise damaged, but they must be dry



Textile waste must be dry. Put it in a clear bag and tie the bag with a knot. Reusable clothing should be sorted out for reuse.



### BULKY WASTE

- Large burnable items
  Furniture, beds, rugs, boards and plates etc.
- Large iron and metal items
  Drying racks, ironing boards, bikes, prams etc.
- Large electronics
  Domestic appliances, TVs, computer screens etc.
- PVC PVC pipes, garden hoses, inflatable water toys, wellingtons etc.
- Impregnated wood
  Outdoor wood, wooden benches etc.

Always place your bulky waste sorted and upright, without stacking it.









### SMALL ELECTRONICS

- IT, phones, tablets, game consoles and chargers
- Toys with electronic components
- Lamps, lights, wires and cables



Electronic waste is anything that uses batteries or contains wires.





### RESIDUAL WASTE

- Sanitary waste, kitchen sponges and polystyrene
- Vacuum cleaner bags and cigarette butts
- Animal bedding, ash and sweepings
- Greasy cardboard and paper









 Plastic packaging from food, drinks, cleaning products and shampoo

 Milk, yoghurt, juice and chocolate milk cartons

 Cartons from foods such as skinned tomatoes, bechamel sauce, vanilla sauce, chickpeas etc.



## PAPER

- Newspapers, magazines, ad circulars and window envelopes
- Notepads and drawing paper







 Cardboard boxes and packaging from toothpaste and food etc.

- Corrugated cardboard and cardboard marks
- Cardboard from dry goods
- Egg trays

Cardboard should be dry and clean. Pizza boxes must always be sorted as residual waste.



## METAL

- Empty cans, tinfoil caps and tea lights
- Cutlery, pots and pans
- Screws, nails and tools etc.
- Tinfoil trays and empty coffee pods

Waste primarily consisting of metal must be sorted as metal, for example a pan with a wooden shaft.





### T FOOD WASTE

- Food scraps both cooked and uncooked
- Shells, grains and vegetables
- Coffee grounds and filters, tea leaves and bags
- Cut flowers

Use only the designated food waste bags – and tie a knot.







Hedge trimmings, weeds, grass

- Flower waste
- Fallen leaves on grass and in beds



You can use open paper bags, but only filled to the line.



# GLASS

- Glass food packaging
- Drinking glasses and glass bottles from beverages or food etc.
- Shards of glass



The glass should be emptied of food or beverages, but there is no need to rinse it or remove the cap.





### HAZARDOUS WASTE

- Paint, spray cans, chemicals and poison
- Fluorescent tubes, low energy and LED light bulbs
- Batteries
- Printer cartridges and nail varnish

The hazardous waste must not be stacked. Never mix leftovers of hazardous waste.



Products and empty packaging marked with these symbols must be sorted as hazardous waste.
